Truths & Principles

- ✓ The risen Christ holds the Spirit of God and the servants of God in His hands.
- ✓ As holder of the key of David, Christ guarantees the open door of heaven to His children.
- ✓ Congregations displease Christ when they are filled with "nominal" good works or with selfsufficient works.
- ✓ The risen Christ earnestly desires full fellowship with each of His congregations.
- ✓ Those who claim to be God's people must be careful not to become a "synagogue of Satan".

The letters to the seven churches conclude in this chapter. Each letter includes a personal assessment of the local church by Jesus Christ, the Lord of the Church. In the Last letter, the Laodiceans are pictured as closing Him out of their church.
