


Paul praises the Thessalonians for their enduring faith in the midst of severe persecution. Their posture toward God is evidence that they are worthy of the coming kingdom of God. Their persecution should not be understood as evidence of God's disfavor. In addition, Paul tells the Thessalonians to take heart because Jesus is coming in power, to make all things right. There will be a role reversal at the Second Coming. The Thessalonians, who are now suffering, will be vindicated and elevated in status. The persecutors, who currently enjoy an upper hand, will be judged and destroyed by Christ. Finally, Paul prays that the name of our Lord Jesus Christ be glorified in them.

Truths & Principles

- ✓ The church exists solely because of Christ and exclusively for His glory.
- ✓ Faith and love must continually increase in a believer's life.
- ✓ Though life in this present time may be full of injustice, a day will come when the ungodly will suffer punishment and those obedient to the gospel will experience God's eternal peace.
- ✓ Hell and heaven are real eternal places.

Applications

- ✓ We should never consider the church "ours" in a possessive, controlling sense.
 The church belongs to Christ.
- ✓ True spirituality is never static; we either progress or lose ground.
- ✓ Our life on earth proceeds for a short time and then we enter eternity. We should order our lives with a focus on the eternal.
- ✓ The realities of hell and heaven should motivate us to live our lives for Christ.
