


Lesson Preview - Introduction



Preview ... Marks of Humble Service

Paul is concerned with the spiritual walk of the Philippians. He praises them for their obedience but wants them to continue their growth by working out their salvation. God is sovereignly controlling their lives, so they are to do all things without grumbling or dispute. They are to show constantly that they are innocent in a crooked world and to stay close to the Word of Life, which is the revealed Word of God.





Lesson Preview - Introduction



Introduction

Christians play both an active and a passive role in their relationship with God. They must believe, yet they must be quickened. To grow spiritually, it is imperative for them to walk in holiness yet to be led by the Spirit as well.


Human accountability and divine sovereignty thus form two sides of the same coin representing the channel of redemptive purpose.

In this lesson, Paul further develops his admonitions to the church (1:27-2:4).

The illustration of Christ's humility only heightened their obligation to become true servants of the gospel.

This portion of scripture is structured around two main commands:

"WORK OUT" (2:12-13) and "DO" (2:14).



Human Responsibility

- Genuine effort involves God and humans as colaborers. Believers cannot become spiritual by themselves, nor can Christ live His life through unyielded vessels.
- The phrase "MY BELOVED" reveals Paul's personal concern for the church. Earlier, he identified them as "BRETHREN" (1:12); later, he used this same description (3:1, 13, 17; 4:8). He joined the two titles later (4:1).
- Paul regarded them as genuine believers and with great affection.

Human Responsibility

OBEDIENCE

- The Philippians' obedience was known to all.
- They always obeyed.
- The adverb "ALWAYS" shows the stability of their Christian walk.
- Links back to the obedience of Christ ... 2:8.

⁸ And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to *the point of* death, even the death of the cross.

Human Responsibility

- Work
 - "WORK OUT" literally means "Keep Working Down".
 - It involves a constant process of self-initiated activity.
 - When a believer is thoroughly working at his spiritual development, he is working out what God is working in.
 - He is putting his position into practice (Ephesians 2:10).
 - Believers should complete what God has started.
 - THREE FEATURES of this work are presented.

⁸ For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; *it is* the gift of God, ⁹ not of works, lest anyone should boast. ¹⁰ For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them.

Human Responsibility

- Work
 - THREE features of this WORK are presented.
 - FIRST, the Time of the Work is seen in the phrase ...
 "NOT AS IN MY PRESENCE ONLY, BUT NOW MUCH MORE IN MY ABSENCE".
 - The "PRESENCE" could refer either to the past during the apostle's first visit to their city or to his anticipated return (1:27; 2:24).
 - Paul has observed the Philippian's rapid spiritual growth, and he also was convinced that they would prosper under his future ministry.
 - He knew, however, that their advancement could not be dependent on his personal supervision of their lives.
 - The strong contrast manifests his concern that they must learn to mature without his personal help.
 - They needed God, to grow in grace and knowledge, but they did not need Paul (2:13).

Human Responsibility

- Work
 - THREE features of this WORK are presented.
 - SECOND, the Object of the Work was the Philippian's own salvation.
 - People cannot work for their salvation, but they can work out their spiritual position (Romans 4:5; Ephesians 2:8-10).
 - Biblical salvation involves deliverance from the penalty of sin - Justification (2 Thessalonians 1:9), from the power of sin - Sanctification (Hebrews 7:25), and from the presence of sin - Glorification (Romans 13:11).
 - These are the three tenses of salvation.
 - The Philippians were saved people (1:6; 3:1); thus salvation here refers to the daily struggle for victory over the sin nature (sanctification).
 - Each believer is responsible for his or her own success or failure. He cannot achieve growth for others, nor can he blame others for his carnality.

Human Responsibility

- Work
 - THREE features of this WORK are presented.
 - THIRD, the Attitude of Work must be "WITH FEAR AND TREMBLING."
 - When believers perceive God as He is and what He wants to do through them, these good emotional response will be produced.
 - They do not mean a psychological frailty or a fear of hostile people and adverse circumstances.
 - Paul preached WITH FEAR AND TREMBLING (1 Corinthians 2:3).
 - The Corinthians revival was marked by those emotions (2 Corinthians 7:15), and so were the lives of obedient Christian slaves (Ephesians 6:5).
 - Obedience and holy emotions are companions.

Your conduct will reflect your character.

Divine Responsibility

- People must work because God is working.
- Four aspects of this Divine Work are presented ...
 - 1. SUBJECT OF THE WORK
 - All persons of the triune Being are actively involved in the life of each believer.
 - The Father is the husbandmen who prunes and cleanses each saint (John 15:1-2).
 - The Holy Spirit produces His fruit within the child of God (Galatians 5:22-23).
 - Christ lives by faith through each Christian (Galatians 2:20).
 - It appears, though, that the name of God here refers to the Father (2:9).
 - The divine activity is literally an "In-Working".
 The transliteration is "the One who Energizes."
 - God's inner work deals with enablement and character, whereas a person's outer work manifests his or her conduct.

Divine Responsibility

- Four aspects of this Divine Work are presented ...
 - 2. LOCATION OF THE WORK
 - God works within the human life ("IN YOU").
 - This involves the total personality -
 - Intellect
 - Emotions
 - Will.
 - God does not want to be excluded from any area of human experience.
 - He is not content just to indwell the body of each believer;
 - He wants to energize the new life He has quickened.

Divine Responsibility

Four aspects of this Divine Work are presented ...

3. Purpose of the Work

 The Two part of the phrase "TO WILL AND TO DO", show the Two goals of the divine in-working.

FIRST, God desires "TO WILL".

- The will of God manifests His purpose. It includes that which He has unconditionally determined to do within the lives of all believers regardless of their faithfulness (Romans 8:28-30).
- It also includes that which He wants to do within each Christian; however, it is conditioned upon the believer's obedience and submission to His will (Romans 12:1-2; 1 Thessalonians 4:3).
- God does not force spirituality on anyone who refuses to have it, but He still continues to work out His purpose. Instead of blessing, He may chastise a disobedient child (Hebrews 12:5-11).
- The commands to repent and to be reconciled are constantly set forth before His erring children.

Divine Responsibility

Four aspects of this Divine Work are presented ...

3. Purpose of the Work

• The TWO part of the phrase "TO WILL AND TO DO", show the TWO goals of the divine in-working.

SECOND, God desires "TO WORK".

- The energy of God manifests His power to accomplish His purpose.
- God never commands a believer to do something without supplying the ability to do it (4:13).
- Divine grace and sufficiency are always available for people to do the tasks appointed them (2 Corinthians 3:5).

⁵ Not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think of anything as *being* from ourselves, but our sufficiency *is* from God,

Divine Responsibility

- Four aspects of this Divine Work are presented ...
 - 4. GOAL OF THE WORK
 - God works for His own glory ("FOR HIS GOOD PLEASURE").
 - All aspects of salvation are executed for the praise of the glory of divine grace (Ephesians 1:6, 12, 14).
 - They are decreed according to the good pleasure of the divine will (Ephesians 1:5, 9).
 - Believers must find pleasure in what brings God pleasure.
 - When they do, they have joy and satisfaction.

⁵ having predestined us to adoption as sons by Jesus Christ to Himself, according to the good pleasure of His will, ⁶ to the praise of the glory of His grace, by which He made us accepted in the Beloved. – Ephesians 1:5-6 ... NKJV

12 that we who first trusted in Christ should be to the praise of His glory. ...

¹⁴ who is the guarantee of our inheritance until the redemption of the purchased possession, to the praise of His glory. ---Ephesians 1:12, 14 ... NKJV





Explanation of the Command

- The First Command (2:12-13) dealt with the believer's VERTICAL relationship to God,
- Whereas the Second Command (2:14) concerns their HORIZONTAL relationship to people and situations.
- Their first was to be obeyed with a positive attitude;
- The second is to be discharged without a negative outlook.

Explanation of the Command

THE ACTION

- Paul simply declared: "Do ALL THINGS."
- This stresses the necessity to keep on doing at all times and in all situations.
- The believer must always be a doer of the Word (James 1:22).
- The direct object ("ALL THINGS") includes all that God has commanded.
- Love for God manifests itself in the keeping of His directions (1 John 5:2).
- Life, outside God's will, is oppressive, but voluntary conformity to the divine will brings rest to the soul (Matthew 11:28-30).

²² But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves. --- James 1:22 ... NKJV

² By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God and keep His commandments. --- 1 John 5:2 ... NKJV

Explanation of the Command

THE ATTITUDE

- Christians are to avoid "COMPLAINING AND DISPUTING."
- When adversity comes, people have a tendency to blame others or God for their difficulties rather than faulting themselves or rejoicing in tribulation.
- When the first sin occurred, Adam blamed God and Eve faulted the serpent (Genesis 3:11-13).
- The noun "COMPLAINING" comes from a verb that means to mutter or grumble.
- It is an "outward expression of an inner lawlessness and rebellion that shakes the fist in the face of God and repudiates His right to rule, that questions His love and wisdom."
- The children of Israel constantly complained when they wandered in the wilderness (Exodus 14:10-12; 15:24; 16:3; 17:3; Numbers 14:2).
- Their complaining actually was directed at God through Moses (Exodus 16:9).

Explanation of the Command

THE ATTITUDE

- The noun "DISPUTING" conveys the ideas of dialog and argument. It emphasizes mental murmuring, whereas complaining reflects an emotional response.
- Both attitudes reveal a spirit of carnality.
- They constitute rebellion against what God wants people to do, when He wants them to do it, where it should be done, and why it should occur.
- In essence, they are like the clay that questions the potter as he fashions it (Romans 9:19-21).
- Such constant bickering will lead to divine chastisement.

19 You will say to me then, "Why does He still find fault? For who has resisted His will?" 20 But indeed, O man, who are you to reply against God? Will the thing formed say to him who formed *it*, "Why have you made me like this?" 21 Does not the potter have power over the clay, from the same lump to make one vessel for honor and another for dishonor? --- Romans 9:12-21 ... NKJV

Purposes of the Command

- A holy reason can always be found behind a divine command.
- The verb "THAT YOU MAY PROVE YOURSELVES", shows that there is a difference between being a Christian and living out the Christian life.
- The former refers to position, the latter to practice.
- Four purposes are expressed.

Purposes of the Command

1. BLAMELESS BEHAVIOR

- The concept "BLAMELESS" means a freedom from censure.
- To be "BLAMELESS" means to be judged by others and found innocent and pure (1 Thessalonians 2:10; 5:23).
- To be "INNOCENT" is to be unmixed or unadulterated.
- The term was used of solid gold jewelry that was without an alloy.
- In medicine it referred to a prescription that was useful but harmless.
- Such spiritual purity, unmixed with sin or hypocrisy, can be attained only by the heat of testing through adversity.

10 You *are* witnesses, and God *also*, how devoutly and justly and blamelessly we behaved ourselves among you who believe;

--- 1 Thessalonians 2:10 ... NKJV

²³ Now may the God of peace Himself sanctify you completely; and may your whole spirit, soul, and body be preserved blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. --- 1 Thessalonians 5:23 ... NKJV

Purposes of the Command

2. SPOTLESS CHILDREN

- Paul called the Philippians to be "CHILDREN OF GOD."
- Sinners become children of God by regeneration through the Holy Spirit (John 1:12) and they inherit the divine nature of their heavenly Father.
- Paul also wanted them to become "ABOVE REPROACH."
- This negative adjective literally means "WITHOUT SPOT OR BLEMISH".
- Believers have been washed of the guilt and filth of their sin so that they are clean in God's sight (John 13:10; 1 Corinthians 6:11).

10 He was in the world, and the world was made through Him, and the world did not know Him. ¹¹ He came to His own, and His own did not receive Him. ¹² But as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God, to those who believe in His name: ¹³ who were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. --- John 1:10-13 ... NKJV

Purposes of the Command

2. SPOTLESS CHILDREN

- Nevertheless, they still must be cleaned from the daily defilement of the world (John 13:10; 1 John 1:9).
- The Philippians' environment was not conductive to holiness, because they lived "IN THE MIDST OF A CROOKED AND PERVERSE GENERATION."
- The word "CROOKED" implies that which is curved in contrast to that which is straight.
- The adjective "PERVERSE" denotes that which is permanently distorted or twisted.
- The world is full of ungodly people who will never be reformed or regenerated; rather, immorality will increase (2 Timothy 3:1-7).
- Believers should not expect to convert the entire world, nor should they permit the world to change them.

⁹ If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us *our* sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. --- 1 John 1:9 ... NKJV

Purposes of the Command

3. LIGHTS IN THE WORLD

- Christians should be separated from the world but not isolated from it.
- They must "SHINE AS LIGHTS IN THE WORLD."
- Christ, as the Light of the World, shone in the world of spiritual darkness (John 1:4).
- Believers, as light, should also let their lights shine (Matthew 5:14, 16).
- Light must function where it is needed in the darkness.

1 In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was in the beginning with God. ³ All things were made through Him, and without Him nothing was made that was made. ⁴ In Him was life, and the life was the light of men. ⁵ And the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not comprehend it.

--- John 1:1-5 ... NKJV

Purposes of the Command

4. WORD BEARERS

- Believers must "HOLD FAST THE WORLD OF LIFE."
- The verb means not just to hold fast to oneself, but also to hold forth to others.
- A person can only witness to that which he or she already possesses.
- Jesus Christ is the Word of Life (1 John 1:1);
- Each portion of Scripture is a word of life about Him.
- The written Word reveals the living Word to those who are dead in spiritual darkness.

1 That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we have looked upon, and our hands have handled, concerning the Word of life— ² the life was manifested, and we have seen, and bear witness, and declare to you that eternal life which was with the Father and was manifested to us— ³ that which we have seen and heard we declare to you, that you also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship *is* with the Father and with His Son Jesus Christ. ⁴ And these things we write to you that your joy may be full. --- 1 John 1:1-4 ... NKJV

Results of the Command

BOASTFUL REJOICING

- Paul knew that he would appear "IN THE DAY OF CHRIST."
- This event includes both the return of the Savior and His subsequent judgment of believers.
- It involves the reunion of the saints with each other and with the Lord (2 Thessalonians 2:1).
- In that day, Paul wanted to rejoice over what his ministry had accomplished in the lives of the Philippians.
- The phrase, "TO GLORY", includes a pride of achievement and should not be limited to mere joy.
- There is joy when a sinner receives salvation, but there is greater joy when spiritual children walk in truth (3 John 1:4).
- Unfortunately, the joy of parenthood is readily lessened by the disobedience of children (Hebrews 13:17).

17 Obey those who rule over you, and be submissive, for they watch out for your souls, as those who must give account. Let them do so with joy and not with grief, for that would be unprofitable for you.

---Hebrews 13:17 ... NKJV

Results of the Command

PRODUCTIVE LABOR

- Paul was not content with merely a good start.
- He wanted his spiritual children to go on to maturity and holiness, to be right both in position and in practice.
- He determined the success of his ministry by TWO concepts.
 - First, he did not want to find out at the Judgement Seat of Christ that he had "RUN IN VAIN." This would occur if he preached a faulty or partial message (Galatians 2:2).
 - Second, he did not want the future to reveal that he had toiled "IN VAIN." Both legalism and Satan could cause this result (Galatians 4:11; 1 Thessalonians 3:5).

² And I went up by revelation, and communicated to them that gospel which I preach among the Gentiles, but privately to those who were of reputation, lest by any means I might run, or had run, in vain. --- Galatians 2:2 ... NKJV



14 Do all things without complaining and disputing, ¹⁵ that you may become blameless and harmless, children of God without fault in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, among whom you shine as lights in the world, 16 holding fast the word of life, so that I may rejoice in the day of Christ that I have not run in vain or labored in vain.



Results of the Command

- PRODUCTIVE LABOR
 - Paul's race and toil were correct.
 - He knew that God would reward his integrity and faithfulness, for no genuine labor is in vain in the Lord (1 Corinthians 15:58).
 - All Christian workers have wondered about the value of their work in the lives of others, especially when those people persistently refuse to follow their leadership.
 - They must, however, finish their course with joy and expectation (Acts 20:24; 2 Timothy 4:6-8).

For I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure is at hand. ⁷ I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. ⁸ Finally, there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will give to me on that Day, and not to me only but also to all who have loved His appearing. --- 2 Timothy 4:6-8 ... NKJV


