






Historical Context - City of Babylon




- In its Heyday, Babylon was the Greatest City in the World
- City's Wall
 - Sixty Miles Circumference
 - ✓ Fifteen Miles on Each Side
 - Three Hundred Feet High
 - Eighty Feet Thick
 - Thirty-Five Feet Below the Ground
 - ✓ Prevent Enemies from Tunneling
 - Over Two Hundred Towers
 - Over One Hundred Brass Gates
- Waters of Euphrates
 - Flowed through the City
 - Provided Water for the City's Moat
 - ✓ Moat ran along the City Wall

Historical Context - Nabopolassar & Necho II



- Nabopolassar King of Babylon
 - Father of Nebuchadnezzar
 - Led Revolt against Assyrians
 - Established Babylonian Empire 625 BC
- Necho II Pharaoh of Egypt
 - Invades Palestine 609 BC
 - Fought King Josiah (Israel) at Megiddo 608 BC
 - √ King Josiah Killed (2 Chronicles 35:20-24)
 - ✓ Necho II returns to Egypt Victoriously
 - ✓ Egyptian Territory Extended to Euphrates River (2 Kings 23:29-30)

2 Chronicles 35:20-24 - King Josiah Killed



²⁰ After all this, when Josiah had prepared the temple, Necho king of Egypt came up to fight against Carchemish by the Euphrates; and Josiah went out against him. ²¹ But he sent messengers to him, saying, "What have I to do with you, king of Judah? *I have* not *come* against you this day, but against the house with which I have war; for God commanded me to make haste. Refrain *from meddling with* God, who *is* with me, lest He destroy you." ²² Nevertheless Josiah would not turn his face from him, but disguised himself so that he might fight with him, and did not heed the words of Necho from the mouth of God. So he came to fight in the Valley of Megiddo.

²³ And the archers shot King Josiah; and the king said to his servants, "Take me away, for I am severely wounded." ²⁴ His servants therefore took him out of that chariot and put him in the second chariot that he had, and they brought him to Jerusalem. So he died, and was buried in *one of* the tombs of his fathers. And all Judah and Jerusalem mourned for Josiah.

Historical Context - Nabopolassar & Necho II



- Nabopolassar King of Babylon

²⁹ In his days Pharaoh Necho king of Egypt went to the aid of the king of Assyria, to the River Euphrates; and King Josiah went against him. And *Pharaoh Necho* killed him at Megiddo when he confronted him. ³⁰ Then his servants moved his body in a chariot from Megiddo, brought him to Jerusalem, and buried him in his own tomb. And the people of the land took Jehoahaz the son of Josiah, anointed him, and made him king in his father's place.

Historical Context - Nebuchadnezzar



- Nebuchadnezzar General
 - Oldest Son of Nabopolassar King of Babylon
 - Nabopolassar Sent Son to Fight Necho II (Egyptian Army) 605 BC
 - Bloody Battle at Carchemish (Jeremiah 46:1-2)
 - ✓ Drove Egyptians back to Egypt

46 The word of the LORD which came to **Jeremiah** the prophet against the nations. ² Against Egypt.

Concerning the army of **Pharaoh Necho**, king of Egypt, which was by the River Euphrates in **Carchemish**, and which **Nebuchadnezzar** king of Babylon defeated in the fourth year of **Jehoiakim** the son of **Josiah**, king of Judah:

Battle of Carchemish



Background

When the Assyrian capital Nineveh was overrun by the Babylonians in 612 BC, the Assyrians moved their capital to Harran. When Harran was captured by the Babylonians in 610 BC, the capital was once again moved, this time to Carchemish, on the Euphrates river. Egypt was allied with the Assyrian king Ashur-uballit II, and marched in 609 BC to his aid against the Babylonians.

The Egyptian army of Pharaoh Necho II was delayed at Megiddo by the forces of King Josiah of Judah. Josiah was killed and his army was defeated. The dead body of Josiah was delivered to Jerusalem immediately and buried according to the customs of Judah's kings, near the grave of King David.

Battle

The Egyptians met the full might of the Babylonian army led by Nebuchadrezzar II at Carchemish where the combined Egyptian and Assyrian forces were soundly destroyed. Assyria ceased to exist as an independent power, and Egypt retreated and was no longer a significant force in the Ancient Near East. Babylonia reached its economic peak after 605 BC.

24 In his days Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon came up, and Jehoiakim became his vassal *for* three years. Then he turned and rebelled against him. ² And the LORD sent against him *raiding* bands of Chaldeans, bands of Syrians, bands of Moabites, and bands of the people of Ammon; He sent them against Judah to destroy it, according to the word of the LORD which He had spoken by His servants the prophets.

 - Hanging Gardens One of the Seven Wonders of the World
 - √ Teenager when Deported from Judah to Babylon 1st Siege ... 605 BC

Siege #1

 1st Siege of Jerusalem: Jehoikim released as a vassal; Temple plundered (for museum); hostages (Daniel et al.) taken. This begins 70-year "Servitude of the Nation" to the day.



Siege #2

- Jehoikim ignores Jeremiah's counsel and rebels. A 5-year battle; Jehoikim dies (Jer 22:17-19). His son, Jehiachin ("Jeconiah"), reigns until the siege is over (Jer 22:24-30). [Blood curse now on royal line? Jer 22:30.]
- Jeconiah is captured along with 10,000 captives, including Ezekiel (Ezek 1:1-3; 2Kgs 24:8-20; 2Chr 36:6-10), 1000 skilled artisans; etc. (2Kgs 24:1-4). Zedekiah, his uncle, installed as vassal at Jerusalem.
- Jeremiah and Ezekiel warn against rebellion but false prophets again prevail...



Siege #3

- 587 B.C.: Zedekiah ignores Jeremiah's and Ezekiel's warnings and yields to false prophets and rebels (Jer 32:5, 39:6,7; Ezek 12:13; 2 Kgs 25:1-7).
- 3rd Siege results in the destruction of the Temple and the city: this begins 70-year "Desolations of Jerusalem" (2 Kgs 24:17-20; 25:1-21). Though also 70 years it is not coterminous with "Servitude."



My net also will I spread upon him, and he shall be taken in my snare: and I will bring him to Babylon to the land of the Chaldeans; yet shall he not see it, though he shall die there.
